From the beginning, oil pastels seem and incredibly easy to master. After all, how complex can a pigment stick and binder really be?! Simple as they might look like oil crayons - this medium is extremely difficult to master. Even those artists who come from a background in the ancient means of oil painting can be quickly engraved on how this particular medium interacts with the surface. Just put... ...there's no other way enough like oil pastels. But if you just got a new set of high-level oil pastels and are trying to expand your creativity, we wanted to put this guide together to help you on your journey. Normally you think with painting, the initial washing must go down first, but the opposite is happening here. As we said at the beginning of this article, oil crayons are notoriously difficult to master. So, take notes of the videos above, but don't think that this is the end all to be all when it comes to this medium. Moreover, we always want to emphasize the time and time again that the supplies no matter as much as the artist who holds the medium. The biggest way to improve as an artist is not to buy professional grade supplies, but instead of getting into the studio and practicing regularly. While it may seem frustrating and hopeless sometimes, that with regular practice really unlocks the joys of creating beautiful works of art! In this I am exploring their most daring cousins, almost more infant - oils; and focus on drawing landscapes or life again. Pigments in oil pastels are tied together with a mixture of wax and fat that gives them a fat texture. The color range is relatively limited compared to chalk pastels, however you can buy sets that contain 96 different shades, you would be hard pressed for more than this. They do not crumble or become dusty, but they smudge and can easily be overloaded in mud. You need to be aware of where the hand ball is restful (I hope not on a already colored part of the page) or draw with the raised hand. If possible start working from top to left delivered. It's trying to start drawing darkly as the colors are so rich and smooth, but start pressing slightly until you feel sure you have the right tone and line. If you make mistakes you can't rub it out! Try different techniques Oil pastels are brilliant to create quick sketches as howfor the paintings. You could fill a sketch book with ideas and drafts very quickly that would help you plan your composition and color combinations. Here I wanted to try to collect some of the sunset yellows on the trunks of the trees and positioning a low horizon with a view mostly filled with attenuated trunks. This first illustration I drew in pencil before and then worked on the individual pieces in the arrangement. I built layers of shadow and finished drawing the highlights with a white pastel. You need to use a thick card to avoid wrinkles - 125gsm or more. Resources: These are the pastels I use, this range also comes in a set of 12, 24 or a much larger set of 96 (drool drool). I would suggest you have a set of at least 48 if you want a good variety of colors. This set contains at least 10 shades - all essential for the design of landscapes.
